Try to think of this summer assignment as not only a way to prepare you for Honors US History, but as a way to become a more sophisticated and aware American. Do a little bit each week and it should be an easy and gentle transition to next year. Save it all for August 30th (don't forget school starts the Thursday BEFORE Labor Day!) and you will be starting the year unnecessarily stressed and miserable.

Following Current Events

You need to create a Current Events Journal in order to keep track of the news as it happens this summer. You need to have at least one journal entry for each week of the summer. That will be **12 entries total.**

For each week, please record the following information:

- 2-3 major events or news stories of the week. Please focus on national or international news. Celebrity news only counts as long as you balance it with other "real" political, social or economic issues.

 Provide a brief (1-3 sentence) summary of each one
- List the sources you used to follow the news (Websites, newspaper, twitter feeds, blogs, *The Daily Show*, etc.)
- Choose one story you find significant and write a paragraph explaining why you think this particular issue or
 event is important. If there is a story that covers more than one week, you can write about it more than
 once, focusing on how it changes over time.

Please find a format that is clear and organized. You may use bullet points to list the events each week. Below is a suggestion that might work for you.

We will talk about major events of the summer on the first week of school. I will expect you to be able to contribute to the conversation and be informed about what's happening in this nation.

Some examples are likely to be the investigation into Russian interference in the election, President Trump's foreign policy, the health care debate and terrorism.

I would recommend getting a small composition book or notebook to do this. If it's easier, creating a running word document on your computer. I will collect the journals the first week of school. We will also be discussing the events of the summer on the first day of school.
