- Thesis statement development
- Supporting a thesis with evidence
- Utilizing the library and internet for research
- Recognizing appropriate sources
- Citing Sources using MLA Format
- Public Speaking

Academic Expectations

- ➤ Class Participation -- is important! Each of you will be expected to take part in discussions on your own and/or when called upon. The majority of course work will be completed in class, meaning you must be prepared to work each day.
- ➤ **Homework** expect it, including studying for exams at home! Work should be completed prior to the start of class on its given due date. There will be long-term projects that require time and planning outside of class.
- Late work is unacceptable and will not be counted.
- ➤ Writing for Understanding writing assignments, which ask you to synthesize information from more than one source, write persuasively in defense of a perspective, or respond to and analyze contemporary and historic events, will be assigned regularly.
- ➤ Quizzes are shorter in length and cover less material than tests, but are important and can have a significant impact on the overall grade. Quizzes may be unannounced, tests will be announced.
- ➤ **Tests** are longer than quizzes and will cover much more material. Tests will be announced in advance so that you will have a chance to prepare.
- ➤ **Time Management** is an essential skill for academic success. A planner or daily agenda is strongly advised to manage assignments, due dates, and events on campus.
- ➤ **Group Work** -- groups will be assigned by the teacher and will change frequently. Your cooperative skills and contributions to group work will impact your participation grade.
- Attendance is vital. Should you miss class, it is your responsibility to find out what you've missed at an appropriate time in class or outside of class time. The late work policy for the class will be the policy stated in the District Handbook. "Students absent one week or less will be allowed double the amount of time they are absent in which to make up missed work. For absences longer than one week, the time allowed will be one week plus the number of days absent." Many activities and experiences cannot be recreated for an individual who misses class. Poor attendance will likely affect your grade.
- **Lying, cheating, plagiarism** or any form of dishonesty will not be tolerated.
- ➤ Cell Phone Policy- Students are allowed to have cell phones in their possession but they are not allowed out in class. If I don't see it or hear it, there will be no issues. If I see it or hear it, it will be confiscated and a parent/guardian will have to pick it up in the office. Refusal to hand over a cell phone when asked will result in consequences assigned by administration. No charging of electronic devices in the classroom!
- **Gum, Candy, Food and Drink-** Not allowed in class.
