



2019-2020 COURSE SYLLABUS

GEOGRAPHY 9 - CP

This course provides freshmen with a greater understanding of world geography and cultures. As an interdisciplinary introduction to social sciences, the course provides the foundation for the later study of World History, United States History, Economics, and United States Government. This course will introduce and develop skills that will be needed in subsequent classes. Such as mapping, analyzing social change over time, and comparing and contrasting diverse cultures. Students are expected to improve academic reading, writing, and critical thinking skills. This course meets the "A" requirement as a History-Social Science class for the UC "A-G" requirements.

Students will also use a variety of supplementary materials, newspaper articles, periodicals, texts as well as internet sites for research of different perspectives and interpretations of the issues covered in class.

Materials Required for This Course:

- The tools of a scholar: a pen, pencil, and highlighter. Although I do loan out these things if you forget or can't get one at this time, you need to go out and buy your own. Kennedy High School feels very strongly that ACTIVE reading includes a pencil and highlighter, so, please get your own.
- A notebook and binder paper: You will need to maintain either a section of your binder or a notebook that will be specifically dedicated for this class.
- Colored Highlighters (Yellow, Blue, Pink and Green)
- Textbook, which will be provided in the form of a classroom set.

The skills we will develop in World Geography:

- Group Work
- Map reading/interpretation skills
- Analyzing, discovering, and creating relationships between statistical data (information in the form of numbers), the physical landscape, and the cultural components of a country
- Reading comprehension skills (finding the main point, summarizing, etc)
- Organizational skills
- Spatial understanding
- Visual analysis



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- Metacognition (fancy word for thinking about our thinking)
- Healthy discussion, listening, and sharing skills
- Goal Setting
- College & Career Readiness
- Technology: Podcasts, Web Quests, Blogs, GPS, etc.

Common Core State Standards:

- o Writing – Written responses every week; Writing prompts which build to larger written assessments.

Classroom Procedures:

- Everyday, you must be in your seat before the bell rings or you are tardy. I am VERY strict about this, so please don't lose track of time when coming from another class.
- Everyday, you will immediately start the warm-up that is on the board, in your binder or notebook.
- All in-class handouts must be carefully stored in a folder. In this class, we save a lot of work because we use it later on in the year. Don't throw anything away unless you are given the green light to do so.
- You are not allowed to put your folder away and pack up unless given permission to do so. I excuse you, not the bell.
- One thing we do not tolerate at Kennedy High School is "no work". Even if you are not bothering someone, if you are just sitting there, you will not be excused to your next class until your work is finished (I am dead serious). If serious effort was shown, you may finish it at home. Your completed work is your ticket out the door!

The Law...of my classroom:

- Respect...yourself. I can't force you to work and I know you don't want me to. If you don't want to stress, if you don't want the drama for you and your family, respect yourself and ALWAYS do the best you can. Have a positive attitude, set high standards for yourself (I will) and do all that you can to achieve. Walk with your head up high knowing that you are becoming smarter by the minute.
- Respect...others. This means your classmates and me. I am not here to pretend I am your mom or dad, but I have to make sure that all students in my classroom are comfortable and safe. Choosing to threaten my comfortable and safe classroom will not only complicate my life and your life, but it will disrupt the learning process and there will be firm consequences. Practice the following daily: listening attentively, being polite, communicating as clearly as you can, waiting your turn, and doing nice things even when you are not asked to.
- Respect... your environment. You are in high school now and there are over 100 students walking in and out of my classroom every day. If just a couple people in every classroom leave trash behind, don't put supplies back, and take supplies out of the classroom without my consent, we will be learning in a dump. There will be consequences for people that disrespect our classroom.
- NOTE: ALL ELECTRONIC DEVICES ARE NOT TO BE SEEN IN CLASS. AT ALL. YOU WILL GET ONE WARNING AND AFTER THAT I WILL CONFISCATE IT. EXCEPT when given permission by the teacher when the class is using them to participate in a class assignment!



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GRADING SYSTEM: Almost every single thing we do will have some sort of point value. The things that are more difficult or take more time will be worth more. It is that simple. I enter points daily and check, in class, when assignments are due.

Grading Categories:

All assignments are worth points and grades will be calculated based on the amount of points earned in each category. Most work will be completed in class, during class time. Work will be divided into the following categories:

Attendance/Tardy Policy:

- If you are tardy you must have an appropriate Tardy Pass either from a Hall Monitor or an Administrator!
- When you are absent you miss valuable class time and activities that cannot be replicated. It is vital you are in class. No make-up will be given for missed, in-class assignments for unexcused absences. If you know you are going to be out please see me to get your work.
- If you are tardy without a pass three or more times you will receive an hour of school detention and a call home. Every following tardy will result in the same result.

 5. Feel good about yourself.
 6. Know that there is nothing in this course beyond your comprehension.

Daily In-class Procedures:

- Take off your hats and hoods, turn off your cell phone, and put it away. If I hear or see your cell phone during class it will be taken and given to the VP.
- Sit down quietly and complete the warm up as soon as possible.
- Be on task and participating.
- When the bell rings at the end of class make sure your seats are straight and there is no trash in your area and all our class materials are returned to the correct place. Then I will dismiss you.
- No food or drinks allowed in class. (Only exception is for bottled water with a screw tight top.) All of the following go along with or exceed the requirements found in the JFK Handbook; please also refer to those for further program and school policies.

Policies for Classwork, Participation, Homework, and Extra Credit Assignments:

- Classwork is a vital part of our day to day lessons and your ability to participate, behave respectfully, and contribute plays heavily into that portion of your grade. Being off task (talking, sleeping, and messing around) is disrespectful to yourself, me, and your classmates and will result in a loss of participation points for the day.
- Homework from a different class is to be done on your own time.
- Late Work will not be accepted after two weeks from the due date.
- Extra Credit Assignments – Will be posted as the school year goes on.

Correspondence:

With the exception of Thursdays (Staff and Department meetings) I am here every day after school for a minimum of a half hour (It is still a good idea to tell me you are coming by). I can also be reached via email and phone for questions and comments. The onus is on you the student to seek me out for help or clarification.
