WORLD HISTORY IP (5 credits/semester)

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This course provides students with a greater understanding of world civilizations and cultures. This course is aligned to the Common Core State Standards for Literacy in History/Social Science and emphasizes the study of European culture because of its significance to the intellectual, political, and social development of the United States. The study of non-western cultures is included to enable the students to perceive the world as an interdependent community. Students are expected to improve academic reading, writing, and critical thinking skills.

Course Objectives

• Acquire fundamental and advanced knowledge of World political, social, economic and intellectual history.

- Develop mastery of the process skills: analysis, synthesis, evaluation, and critical reading necessary for mastery of the content of World History.
- Develop the ability to recognize the significance of change over time and cause and effect.

• Develop the ability to think and reason analytically as demonstrated through essay and expository writing

• Develop and display an appreciation for the rich diversity in today's Global society through successful class participation, challenging reading, and collaborative work.

Academic Expectations
