World History provides students with a greater understanding of world civilizations and cultures. This course is aligned to the Common Core State Standards for Literacy in History/Social Science and emphasizes the study of European culture because of its significance to the intellectual, political, and social development of the United States. The study of non-western cultures is included to enable the students to perceive the world as an interdependent community. Students are expected to improve academic reading, writing, and critical thinking skills.

Course Objectives

- · Acquire fundamental and advanced knowledge of world political, social, economic and intellectual history.
- Develop mastery of the process skills: analysis, synthesis, evaluation, and critical reading necessary for mastery of the content of World History.
- · Develop the ability to recognize the significance of change over time and cause and effect.
- Develop the ability to think and reason analytically as demonstrated through essay and expository writing.
- Develop and display an appreciation for the rich diversity in today's global society through successful class participation, challenging reading, and collaborative work.

Textbook

World History: Human Legacy. Austin: Holt, Rinehart, and Winston, 2008. Students will also be reading a variety of additional texts, including news articles, personal narratives and literature.

Academic Expectations

- We are here to learn together. We are a community as well as individuals and we should each remember that when engaging in things that distract from that mission, such as texting, eating, drinking, working on other things, sleeping, rude behavior, long walks to the bathroom, etc.

Plagiarism/ Cheating

"Plagiarism is the attempt to pass off the ideas, research, theories, or words of others as one's own" (College Board). Plagiarizing any assignment will result in a 0 for the assignment. Cheating on any quiz or test will also immediately result in a zero for that assignment. Students caught cheating will not be able to make up the points lost on these assignments. Plagiarism or cheating the first time will also lead to an Unsatisfactory mark for Citizenship for the semester. Students found cheating or plagiarizing a second time will automatically fail the class and be referred to site administrators.

Technology Use (JFK Handbook)
