ADVANCE ENGLISH 9P (EZS103-3 and EZS103-5)

COURSE DESCRIPTION: Advance English 9 classes approach English Language Arts with an emphasis on building students' reading ability, thinking skills, and sense of efficacy. Students will gain the confidence, experience, and skills critical for literacy success and, most importantly, see themselves as successful students. Our curriculum at JFK Advance English 9 includes independent reading as well as a literacy curriculum which emphasizes expository and literary texts aligned to the ELA Common Core State Standards. In addition, students will learn to write a variety of essays and practice reading analysis and comprehension. Vocabulary development and grammar lessons will be integrated into all units. The curriculum for Advance English 9P follows the standards outlined by the new national Common Core State Standards (Grade 9).

COURSE OBJECTIVES: In addition to developing and improving the reading, writing, thinking and other literacy skills described in the above course description, students in Advance English 9 will learn academic reading, writing and speaking skills. Attention will be focused on how to interact with text and how to think critically about what you've read including:

- (1) The powerful use of words and language; the writer's tools and tricks of the trade on how to become a better writer.
- (2) Making sense of grammar, parts of speech, Latin/Greek roots and vocabulary.
- (3) The writing process and various forms of writing (Narrative, Descriptive, Informative/Explanatory, Argumentative, et al).
- (4) Analyze challenging texts, literature, short stories, personal narratives, novels, plays, essays, editorials, speeches, informational texts.

CLASS TEXT:

- Thematically grouped literary and expository texts included in the curriculum (provided by the teacher)
- Holt Literature & Language Arts, Third Course: Holt, Rinehart and Winston
- Novels: *The Pearl, The Absolutely True Diary of a Part-Time Indian, Z for Zachariah, Romeo and Juliet,* various short stories, selected poems, political speeches, and professional essays.
