Course Description

Welcome to World History, Culture and Geography: The Modern World. This course is designed to give an equivalent of one year and 10 credits of the 10th World History requirement toward high school graduation. The course provides the foundation for later study of history, economics, and government; and provides sophomores with a greater understanding of world civilizations and cultures. Aligned to the Common Core State Standards for Literacy in History/Social Science, this course emphasizes the rise of democracy through study of European culture because of its significance to the intellectual, political and social development of the United States; and the study of non-western cultures to enable students to perceive the world as an interdependent community.

Fall Course Outline:

Topic	Subject Matter
1	Philosophies of ancient Greece and Rome, and Judeo-Christianity on the development Western political thought.
2	Effects of England’s Glorious Revolution, the American Revolution, and the French Revolution for self-government and individual liberty worldwide.
3	Effects of the Industrial Revolution in England, France, Germany, Japan, and the United States.
4	New Imperialism (economic and cultural dominance of strong nations over less developed nations) in Africa, Southeast Asia, China, India, Latin America, and the Philippines.

Spring Course Outline:

Topic	Subject Matter
5	Causes and course of the First World War
6	Effects of the First World War
7	Rise of totalitarian (overly controlling, dictator driven) governments after World War I
8	Causes and consequences of World War II.
9	International developments in the post-World War II world.
10	Nation building in the Middle East, Africa, Mexico, Latin America, and China.
11	Integration of countries into the modern world economy; and the information, technological, and communications revolutions, (e.g. television, satellites, computers).

Course Objectives and Academic Requirements:

- The platform for this 10th grade class is to foster core knowledge in world history; create an environment for improving English literacy skills - academic reading, writing, and critical thinking skills; and promoting curiosity and confidence, and questioning and success.
- The letter grade will be based on participation in classroom activities and discussions, reading assignments in the textbook and other primary source materials, lecture notes, writing assignments, homework, individual and cooperative group projects, oral presentation, quizzes, and tests. Any Extra Credit is issued at the discretion of the teacher.
- All work that is not collected immediately will be kept in a binder or an in-class folder, (provided by the teacher), until collected and graded at regular intervals, and posted in the Infinite Campus online portal.
- It is extremely important that the student stays current with all assignments. Late work will not be accepted. Exceptions regarding late work will be given to students with excused absences. Consideration for additional time to complete assignments may be given to a student with an active 504 Accommodations or Independent Educational Plan (IEP). Regardless of exceptions, late work will not be accepted beyond the date of an exam.
- Organization and neatness of the student's work, (including penmanship) is very important.
