#### **Course Description:**

Welcome to AP English Language and Composition! We will be learning how writers use rhetorical modes and literary techniques/devices/elements to convey significant messages to a wide audience. We will practice writing works that describe, define, narrate, explain, argue, and synthesize other texts.

The purpose of this course is to meet graduation requirements and prepare you for the rigorous reading, analysis, and writing that will be required of you in college and on the job.

# **Grading Policy**

All assignments are worth points and grades will be calculated based on the amount of points earned in each category. Most work will be completed in class, during class time. Work will be divided into the following categories:

- Final (20%)
- Classwork (40%)
  - o graphic organizers, warm-ups, reflections, responses to pre-reading/post-reading questions, grammar exercises, discussions, socratic seminars, activities
- Writing (40%)
  - o formal in-class essays and creative writing assignments, extended writing prompts, critical thinking questions

We will cover all that we can in class, but there may be work outside of class as well. This will typically be in the form of reading, researching for an in class project, preparing for an in-class discussion, or reviewing for a test.

#### Class Overview (subject to change)

### Unit 1: Introduction to Rhetorical Analysis, Techniques, and Advanced Placement Philosophy

As an introduction to Advanced Placement Language and Composition, students report to their first class with the assignment completed over the summer hiatus. With each piece, we delve into the rhetorical strategies – diction, tone, syntax, imagery, and detail – in order to create a basis for analysis and to recognize different writing styles.

#### **Unit 2: Argument and Fallacy**

After learning the principles of rhetoric students must see how they apply. We begin with a close reading and analysis of various essays and move into writing and development.

#### **Unit 3: Tone and Purpose**

This unit will focus on the ability to recognize tone and purpose in various works. Through close reading and careful rhetorical analysis the process of writing with these elements will become clearer. By this point students should be more in tune with what is expected of them on the exam. This unit will challenge and refine the skills previously acquired.

# Unit 4: The Power of Language

This unit will focus not only on the language we use, but HOW we use the language. Students will have the opportunity to view different perspectives on the same topics, assess the importance of audience and its impact on writing.

# Unit 5: Satire and Humor as Argument

In this unit students will learn to satirize and create humor in order to open the eyes of their audience. Through writing, observation, and discussion about topics like what our passions are and the things that make us laugh, students will be able to create and relate important topics to their audience.

# Unit 6: Preparation and Insight into the AP Exam

This unit will be the culmination of our year. At this point students will focus on the test ahead through constant reading, writing, practice and analysis. Together we will view sample essays from past exams and score them based on the techniques acquired. In addition, students will use peer review to sharpen their style and voice.
